Building International Partnerships between Sri Lanka & the UK

UKOWLA CONFERENCE

A conference was held in June that was run in collaboration with AdoptSri Lanka TWINS, the Eden Project and UKOWLA. The conference brought together community based groups and individuals from the UK who have links with partners in Sri Lanka.

UKOWLA was formed in 1984 in response to the growing number of community and school partnerships springing up around the UK. UKOWLA is an umbrella organisation for such partnerships.

Representatives from AdoptSri Lanka TWINS participated in the conference as well as many of our UK based TWIN schools. The conference gave participants the opportunity to learn more about each other and to promote and develop community and school based links between the two countries for a mutual benefit.

Feedback received after the conference has reinforced the importance of establishing a partnership agreement between schools involved in the TWINS program. These agreements help lay a solid foundation for a partnership which is based on mutual

goals and shared responsibility which strives for realistic and meaningful outcomes.

Angela Cook stated:

“The theme has been about children and young people. Listening to our first speakers and listening in on the workshops, it is vital that we educate our children, these links are not just about fundraising and giving, it’s about making real friendships, understanding, learning and being prepared to learn.”

This conference was also run in collaboration with DFID Global School Partnerships (DGSP) program which is delivered by a consortium of the British Council, Cambridge Education Foundation. For more information about this initiative and various funding opportunities visit:

Establishing a Partnership Agreement with your TWIN

A TWINS Partnership Agreement is a formal agreement which is signed by both TWIN schools.

Each partnership is unique and therefore the agreements should be designed to reflect the needs and goals of the TWIN schools involved.

A TWINS Partnership Agreement ensures that both schools understand what their TWIN school hopes to achieve through their partnership.

It clearly outlines a shared vision for the future, goals for educational exchange and a commitment to fulfil these obligations. This agreement must be developed in partnership with

your TWIN school in order to be effective.

ASL TWINS have recently developed various information guides to assist TWIN schools to formalise their partnership.

This includes:

- a guide to establishing a partnership agreement with your TWIN
- information on funding available to visit your TWIN
- templates for your agreement
- information on establishing a project exchange agreement

Our Field Officers can support your school to develop an agreement in partnership with your TWIN school. Our hope is that all schools involved in the TWINS program will develop these agreements in the coming months.

Effective and equitable partnerships should be based on shared educational goals, regular participation, commitment, inclusiveness and an aim for meaningful and sustainable outcomes.

Anusha Liyanage has now joined the TWINS team as the Region 1 Field Officer. She brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the program.

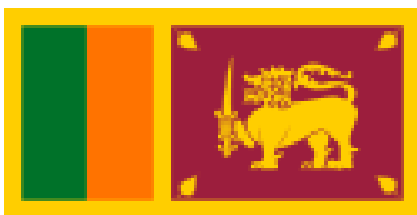
Sahan who previously worked as our Building Projects Manager will continue with this role but will also become a Special Projects Officer, helping to coordinate TWINS Events.

In Term 1, the TWINS Debating Tournament for Provincial Schools was held in the Galle region. After the huge success of these events TWINS decided to follow this up in Term 2 with Debating Tournaments in the Tangalle and Matara Regions.

From these finals 6 teams were selected to compete in the inaugural TWINS Program Provincial School Debating Tournament 'Super Six' Final.

Students had the opportunity to compete with neighboring schools and demonstrate their debating skills. The debates enable students to challenge their opinions and practice their public speaking skills while representing their school.

This Tournament Series was the first of its type for provincial schools in the Southern Province.

A teacher accompanying one of the teams said:

“This was the first time that children from provincial schools have had the opportunity to take part in an event of this type. It is wonderful to see such healthy competition between the

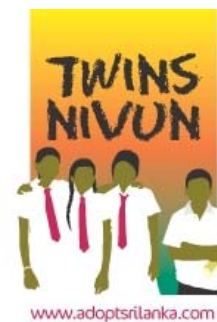
Twins Project Exchange Ideas
